• 19% over August 2023






SMART Ridership (Monthly)



Free Fare Program


- Free Fares program for youth and seniors began April 1st
- Incomplete data for detailed analysis
 - Youth and seniors not required to tap on/off
 - Staff conducted random sampling of trips
 - Manually counted to produce estimate
- 30% ridership increase Apr-Jul '23 vs '24
 - Adults +12%
 - Youth +99%
 - Senior +144%
 - Large increase during off-peak hours






Free Fare Program

Demographics








Monthly Pathway Counts

September 2022-July 2024







SMART Connect Expansion

- Ridership for the SMART Connect Airport shuttle has been low but steady throughout the first year
- July 2024 total ridership has doubled over July 2023
- July average daily shuttle ridership:
 - Airport: 13 passengers/day
 - Larkspur: 46 passengers/day
- SMART will make the following changes to the SMART Connect Airport service, effective 8/25:
 - 1. Expanding shuttle service hours to include the 7:25 AM northbound train arrival, facilitating more commute hour ridership
 - 2. Expanding shuttle service area to include the residential neighborhood of Larkfield-Wikiup, Sutter Regional Hospital and the Luther Burbank Center for the Arts






Bike Locker Update

- Based on customer feedback, SMART retrofitted a locker at each station to provide larger locker spaces
- Large lockers can accommodate larger bikes and some cargo bikes
- As part of this retrofit, one locker space was removed at each station to make room for a larger locker
- SMART now has 80 bike lockers across all stations

Bike Locker Update

- The new larger lockers are labeled and cost \$0.08 an hour, compared to the \$0.05 an hour for standard bike lockers
- With a BikeLink account, individuals can store value and rent a locker three ways:
 - 1) Through the BikeLink app,
 - 2) With an activated BikeLink Card available for purchase through BikeLink's website; or
 - 3) With a Clipper Card
- BikeLink is also making improvements to the App to allow customers to view real-time locker availability

- Windsor residents are not accustomed to active railway traffic, so it's important to raise awareness about the new conditions.
- Our outreach plan includes collaboration with schools and community groups in Windsor to disseminate rail safety information.





Agenda Item 7 - Marin-Sonoma Bike Share Program



Project Background

- Sonoma County Transportation Agency (SCTA) and the Transportation Authority of Marin (TAM) were awarded a Bike Share Capital Program grant by MTC in August 2018
- A Program Agreement was signed by SCTA and Gotcha Mobility LLC in April 2020; in summer 2022, the contractor ceased operations, and SCTA terminated the agreement
- A new procurement process began June 2023, with Drop Mobility awarded contract for Bike Share operator in December 2023


Program Summary

- Two-year Pilot Program
- Participating jurisdictions: Cities of Larkspur, San Rafael, Novato, Petaluma, Cotati, Rohnert Park, and Santa Rosa, Golden Gate Bridge Highway and Transportation District, and SMART
- Bike Share facilities include eleven of the twelve existing SMART stations; bike share was not proposed for SMART Sonoma County Airport Station
- Tentative hub locations include the Larkspur Ferry Terminal, Santa Rosa
 Transit Mall, and Coddingtown Transit Center, facilitating transit connections
 to and from SMART stations
- Target launch date is Fall 2024



Program Summary

- 300 shared electric-assist bicycles, distributed across 75 hubs in the two counties
- Branding: Redwood Bikeshare
- Number of bikes at hubs will range from 5 to 20
- Bikes will be redistributed by Drop daily and include swappable batteries

Authorize the General Manager to sign the License Agreement for the Marin-Sonoma Bike Share Pilot Program between SMART and Drop Mobility.





Agenda Item 8 – Award Contract No. PL-PS-24-001 with Modern Railway System




Project Background

- SMART currently offers real-time train arrivals, live GPS-based train location, and real-time service alerts visible on various mobile tripplanning apps
- Real-Time Signage emerged as a priority for SMART during listening sessions and will allow this information to be visible on station platforms and for people without a smartphone
- Funded by a Clean California Grant, awarded October 2023



Real-Time Signage Overview

- SMART is procuring 32-inch "electronic paper" displays
- Displays are black-and-white, low power, high resolution, high contrast, and illuminated at night
- Displays will be installed in station shelters



Real-Time Signage Overview

- Displays include an ADA-compliant pushbutton and multilingual text-to-speech system for visually-impaired users
- Displays can show next train arrivals, service alerts, transfer information, and first-and-last mile options
- Displays will be especially useful for major service disruptions, where information on train annulments and bus bridges can be displayed





Contracting Process

- SMART issued an Invitation for Bid for the Procurement, Installation, and Support of the Real-Time Signage on May 29, 2024
- SMART held a Pre-Bid Meeting on June 7, 2024, to discuss the project requirements and minimum product specifications with interested bidders
- SMART received two bids from the following bidders on July 8, 2024:
 - Modern Railway Systems
 - Way Sine, LLC
- The lowest responsive responsible bidder was Modern Railway Systems with a total bid price of \$537,755.26




Today's Recommendation

Approve Resolution No. 2024-25 Authorizing the General Manager to award Contract No. PL-PS-24-001 with **Modern Railway Systems** to furnish, install, and support **Real-Time Information Displays** at SMART stations in the amount of \$537,755.26, and additional approval authority of up-to \$43,165.75 for project contingency for a total project cost of up to \$580,921.01.



Next Steps

- Upon Board Approval, SMART will work to finalize our agreement with the contractor and issue a Notice to Proceed
- Contractor will install real-time displays in the coming months
- Displays are expected to be online by late 2024
- Staff will provide a Board update when the signage is live

Helen Putnam Regional Park


Two Locations:

Windsor Drive Drainage:

An erroded channel with sparse riparian vegetation, carrying seasonal drainage to a culvert beneath Windsor Drive.

Upper Pond Drainage:

Freshwater stream that supports intermittent flow and drains into Cattail Pond which is publicly accessible fishing pond.




